 - 2. The manna ceases: extraordinary and ordinary providence reveal God's sovereign care.

- C. "Devoted to Destruction"
 - 1. Preliminary questions:
 - a. Is this the way war should be carried out generally?
 - (i) No, even Israel is told that this is only to happen to nations in the land / under certain circumstances (See Deut. 20:10-20)
 - (ii) There is something unique going on here in redemptive history
 - b. Was this some sort of ethnic cleansing?
 - (i) No, it is not based on their ethnicity but their rampant evil (see Gen. 15:16, Deut. 9:5)
 - (ii) Israel, too, would face judgment if they rebelled (see Lev. 18:26-29)

- 2. How should we understand this total destruction/ban?
 - a. All people are sinful and deserve nothing but judgment (cp. Gen 6)
 - b. God is often patient with the wicked, yet they continue storing up wrath and judgment (Gen. 15:16)
 - c. God gives the people reasons to repent by showing his power and authority (Josh 2:9, 11; Josh. 5:1)
 - d. When a person repents, the Lord relents of his judgment (see Rahab in Josh. 6:17)
 - e. **God is committed to holiness and justice**. Israel will face judgment if they reject Yahweh too (Lev. 18:26, Josh. 7:1, Is. 10:5-6)
- 3. What the "ban" points to:
 - a. The "ban" is a precursor, a foretaste, of final judgment
 - b. A foretaste of where history is going
 - (i) God will bring his people into his place, under his rule
 - (ii) And all who continue in rebellion must be judged
- 4. The gospel offers salvation and warns of judgment (Romans 1:16-18)
- **D.** Joshua 6:26-27 a curse against any that would rebel against God (1 Kings 16:29-34)

IV. What does the conquering of an ancient, fortified city have to do with us?

- A. Tells Us about God Our God
 - 1. He fulfills his promises
 - 2. He will judge all sin
- B. Calls Forth Our Faith in God Allegiance to God and Depending on God
